

2021 Legislative Update

WE MADE IT THROUGH ANOTHER LEGISLATIVE SESSION, AND THIS NEWSLETTER OUTLINES SOME IMPORTANT CHANGES THAT WERE MADE TO OUR ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES DUE TO RECENT LEGISLATION.

Wondering what is going on with breakfast??? As some of you may recall, deadlines

had previously been put in place for the adoption of alternative breakfast service models in our schools. Due to the pandemic, all those deadlines have been pushed back a year! EVER WORRY THAT A STUDENT WILL GET LEFT ON THE BUS? Well, now state law requires all bus drivers to inspect their entire bus at the end of every route! Need a mental health day? Well state law now states that a valid and legitimate reason

for students to be excused from school includes their mental or behavioral health. Moreover, documentation from a medical professional is not required to substantiate a valid excuse of a mental or physical illness. Unfortunately, suicide affects youth of all ages. As a result of the growing need for

youth suicide prevention programs at the elementary school level, state law now requires that we provide a youth suicide prevention program to elementary students that covers the following components:

- 1. life affirming education, including the concepts of resiliency, healthy habits, self-care, problem solving, conflict resolution;
- 2. methods for strengthening the family; and
- 3. methods of strengthening a youth's relationships in the school and community.

Do you have parents questioning what curriculum the district uses? State

law now requires that all curriculum that the district uses be readily available for parents to view. Additionally, the district will notify parents annually of how to access the district's curriculum, and this information will be posted on the district's website. Is your school's website getting cluttered? Well good news, state law just removed

the requirements that certain information related to your school community councils be posted on your website. For example, you no longer have to post the proposed SCC meeting schedule; contact information for each SCC member; an invitation to parents to serve on the SCC, and other items have been removed as well! Truancy and/or Compulsory Education Violations in the 2021-2022

school year??? NOT SO FAST!!! Please note that state law has pressed pause on the issuance of any truancy violations and/or compulsory education violations for the 2021-2022 school year. To be clear, no such violations can be issued. School staff can still work with families to address attendance concerns though other interventions, but notices of violations cannot be issued. Please be aware that state law now permits DCFS to file a report with UPPAC against

any licensed educator who it believes knowingly failed to report suspected abuse, neglect, fetal alcohol syndrome, or fetal drug dependency --- all forms of child abuse. As a reminder all employees are required to report suspected child abuse to DCFS or a law enforcement official.
